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Babe Brown's No-Hitter

July 9, 1904

The first no-hitter in Pelican history was thrown by a slim 20-year old named Harry C. "Babe" Brown, who walked five Shreveport batters in the process. Backed by Joe Rickert (3-for-4), Joe Stanley and Frenchy Genins (2-for-4), the Pelicans produced 5 runs on 12 hits. Unfortunately, Brown would die in Shreveport in less than two months from injuries received in a street fight.
